- Free and Reduced Lunch: 36%

How We Did It -Students

- Students were introduced to RTI²-B through activity teachers
- Classroom teachers reinforced initial teaching using various methods to fit their setting
- Students were presented with examples and non-examples
- Students were then provided opportunity for repeated demonstration in all settings
- Students were encouraged to continue these behaviors outside of school
- Students were encouraged to notice and report positive behaviors of their peers

How We Did It - Parents

 Specifics about RTI²-B were shared in several ways...

 Notes sent home to Parents
Students received a reward for returning signed notes

Parent Advisory Committee

- All Parents are informed about meeting and invited to attend
- Presentation to parents included overview of positive behavior system (as most parents are unfamiliar with this method)
- Parents were invited to seek out these behaviors at home and in the community and then report back to teachers through email, REMIND app, etc. The goal was to encourage students to continue positive behaviors outside of school.

Social Media

 Students who earned rewards were posted on school social media page

 Community members commented on the positive behavior

Parents were allowed to share in positive achievements

Grade Level Parent Involvement


 Each month a different grade level does a presentation for parents during the school day.

 RTI²-B is highlighted at these meetings & parents are encouraged to be on the look out for positive behaviors and report those back to the teacher.

What it looks like

- Students who chose positive behaviors were caught by:
 - Each other
 - Faculty / staff
 - Members of the community

Students received signatures on their Eagle Way Arrow for these exhibiting positive behaviors.




